6. **COMMUNICATIONS / ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL**

7. **INDIVIDUALS WISHING TO ADDRESS COUNCIL**

Sam Davis, 400 E. Washington Street, spoke to express support for a proposed municipal penny sales tax and to express concern with the City not receiving proportionate benefit from the proposed County penny sales tax. Mr. Davis suggested that the City request that language be removed from the County's proposed ordinance that would exempt the County from providing the City with a pro rata share if the City were to enact its own tax.

Councilmember Belge asked if the County had the ability to amend an ordinance during third reading. City Attorney Leigh Paoletti responded that the County does have a mechanism to suspend the rule that would prevent any changes to be made during third reading. Mr. Davis stated that the County has already suspended the rule.

Bruce Wilson, Greenville County, spoke to advocate for legal protection for the homeless population and expressed the need for a less complicated system for an individual to receive assistance from a public defender.

Mayor Pro Tem Dowe and City Manager Shannon Lavrin recognized a total of 228 years of service from this year's municipal retirees and acknowledged the retirees individually, thanking them for their service to the city of Greenville.

9. PUBLIC HEARING

- a. Proposed Abandonment of a portion of right-of-way on White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard (AB-2-2026)

Engineering Services Director Clint Link advised that the proposed abandonment is included in road realignment and improvements as a part of the Wade Hampton Boulevard Strategic Plan to address roadway and pedestrian safety near White Oak Baptist Church and Bob Jones University. Mr. Link stated that the City has worked with property owners and has received support for the proposed abandonment and related improvement projects.

There were no public comments provided during the Public Hearing in support or opposition of the item.

(AB-2-2026)

Document Summary:

The city of Greenville (the "City") is proposing to abandon portions of White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard as part of the White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard improvements project. The proposed road improvements are being implemented as part of the Wade Hampton Boulevard Strategic Plan to address roadway and pedestrian safety. The improvements include realigning each road, widening each road to current standards, and improving the roads with curbs, sidewalks, drainage, landscaping and resurfacing. The proposed improvements also include reconstruction of the White Oak Baptist Church parking lots and modifications to the Bob Jones University's Campus View Apartments Parking Lot.

As part of the road realignments, the City is acquiring new right-of-way from several abutting properties, abandoning the existing right-of-way, and reconfiguring properties to the new roads as shown in the Exhibit.

The abandonment has been reviewed by the City Engineering, Public Works, Fire, and Police departments as well as local utility providers with no objections found.

Impact if Denied:

Right-of-way agreements will not be executed and the White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard Improvements project cannot be implemented as proposed.

TO ABANDON A PORTION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY ON WHITE OAK ROAD AND
BRADLEY BOULEVARD (AB-2-2026)

WHEREAS, the city of Greenville (the “City”) may have rights and/or entitlements to White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard to the extent that they are public right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, the City is proposing the White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard Improvements Project which will include realigning each road, widening each road to current standards, and improving the roads with curb and gutter, sidewalks, storm drainage, landscaping, and resurfacing; and

WHEREAS, as part of the roadway realignments, the City proposes to abandon portions of the existing public right-of-way no longer needed for each road, acquire new right-of-way for the realigned roads, and reconfigure the existing properties identified as Tax Map Numbers 0275000500101, 02750000700601, 02750000700600, 0275000500100, and 0275000500500 to front the new roads; and

WHEREAS, the abandonment will not result in any adverse impacts to traffic circulation, local access, or operations of the City’s street system; and

WHEREAS, the right-of-way will be abandoned and combined with Tax Map Numbers 0275000500101, 0275000500100, and 0275000500500 as shown in Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to properly published notice, a public hearing was held before City Council on Monday, June 22, 2026, at which time Council provided the opportunity to hear from the public regarding the proposed abandonment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA, a total 43,397 square feet (0.996 acre) of right-of-way along White Oak Road and Bradley Boulevard, which is identified more particularly in Exhibit A, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein, shall be abandoned and closed as a public right-of-way. Further, the abandonment and any subsequent conveyance by way of City quitclaim deed shall be subject to a full width utility easement preserving the currently existing rights and benefits for the present providers of water, sewer, electricity, telephone, and natural gas, if any, including maintenance easements for the same utilities. The City Manager is herewith authorized to execute such documents as are reasonable to implement the purposes of this Ordinance.

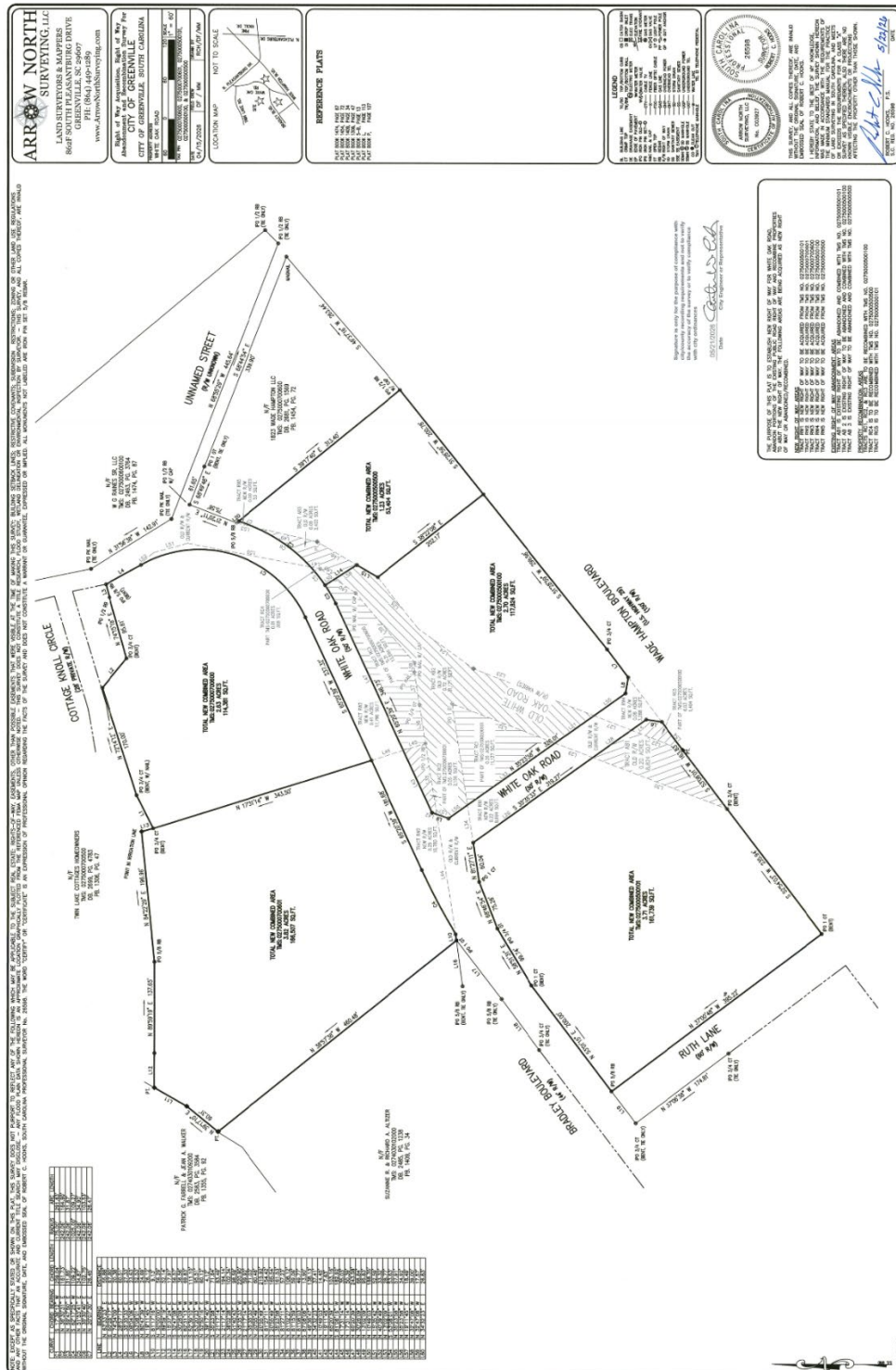

Document Summary:

This Ordinance appropriates a total of \$55,211 in the Miscellaneous Grants Fund to purchase ballistic vests for the City of Greenville Police Department. The funding consists of a \$27,605 award from the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (FY 2025 Patrick Leahy Bulletproof Vest Partnership Program) and \$27,606 in matching funds from the Law Enforcement Special Revenue Fund.

Impact if Denied:

The City will have to reject the award and assume the full costs associated with the purchase of body armor for the Greenville Police Department.

AN ORDINANCE TO APPROPRIATE \$535,049 IN THE OPIOID GRANT FUND TO REFLECT SOUTH CAROLINA OPIOID RECOVERY FUNDS OF \$515,049 AND \$20,000 IN INTEREST EARNINGS

Document Summary:

The city of Greenville (the "City") participated in opioid-related litigation settlements led by the State of South Carolina as a Participating Political Subdivision. To access its Guaranteed Political Subdivision Subfund Allocation, the City is required to submit an annual Technical Proposal for an approved abatement strategy to the South Carolina Opioid Recovery Fund Board. The City requested funding to support the Fire Department's Opioid Response Team (ORT) for a fourth year. The proposal for Year 4 funding was approved, and \$515,049 has been released to support the ORT. This Ordinance also appropriates \$20,000 in interest earnings, as required by the South Carolina Opioid Recovery Fund Board.

In 2023, \$525,437 was received to establish the Opioid Response Team and \$630,540 and \$374,624 were received in 2024 and 2025, respectively, to continue its work. The ORT utilizes preventative outreach, education, and emergency response to mitigate the impact of the opioid epidemic in Greenville.

Impact if Denied:

The City will be unable to support the Opioid Response Team in its fourth year of operation.

Financial Impact:

\$535,049 in Opioid Recovery Funds and interest earnings will be appropriated.

WHEREAS, to access its available Guaranteed Political Subdivision Subfund Allocation, the City is required to annually submit a Technical Proposal requesting funding for an approved abatement strategy to the South Carolina Opioid Recovery Fund Board; and

WHEREAS, the City’s Technical Proposal to sustain its Opioid Response Team for a fourth year under the operation of the Greenville City Fire Department was approved by the South Carolina Opioid Recovery Fund Board; and

WHEREAS, the Opioid Response Team will continue to use a combination of preventative outreach initiatives, education, and emergency response to remediate the impact of the opioid epidemic in Greenville; and

WHEREAS, the City requested and was awarded \$515,049, which will be used to support the Opioid Response Team in its fourth year; and

WHEREAS, the funding request programmed interest earnings of \$20,000, which also will be used to support the Opioid Response Team;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA, the amount of \$535,049 is appropriated in the Opioid Grant Fund to support the Opioid Response Team under the direction of the Greenville City Fire Department as reflected in the attached Exhibit. This Ordinance shall become effective upon passage on the second and final reading.

AN ORDINANCE ENACTED PURSUANT TO THE MUNICIPAL TAX RELIEF ACT, TITLE 5, CHAPTER 41 OF THE CODE OF LAWS OF SOUTH CAROLINA, 1976, AS AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOSITION OF A ONE PERCENT SALES AND USE TAX TO PROVIDE PROPERTY TAX RELIEF TO OWNER-OCCUPIED HOMES AND TO FINANCE CERTAIN PROJECTS UPON REFERENDUM APPROVAL; THE FORM OF THE BALLOT TO BE USED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO

Document Summary:

This ordinance authorizes the City of Greenville, subject to approval by city residents at the November 3, 2026, general election, to impose a one-percent municipal sales and use tax pursuant to the Municipal Tax Relief Act. The measure establishes the purposes for which the tax may be used, including funding a defined list of capital projects and providing a nonrefundable credit against municipal ad valorem taxes on owner-occupied homes. This ordinance sets the tax's maximum duration, outlines the required ballot question, and provides a tiered priority system for allocating project funding. The ordinance also directs the City Clerk and City Manager to undertake all actions necessary to submit the referendum question to the electorate and to implement the ordinance following approval.

Impact if Denied:

The City will not impose a one-percent municipal sales and use tax, subject to approval of city residents at the November 3, 2026, general election.

Financial Impact:

Over the eight year implementation period of the Municipal Tax Relief Act (MTRA), the City projects that a total of \$511,616,050 in sales tax revenue will be generated and allocated according to the requirements of the Act. Under MTRA, 20% of all anticipated sales tax collections must be dedicated to property tax relief for owner-occupied homes, with the remaining 80% reserved for eligible municipal projects. Allocation of Projected Revenue: Property Tax Relief (20%) - The City estimates that \$102,323,210 will be directed toward reducing property taxes for owner-occupied homes. This recurring annual relief is intended to offset the burden of rising property valuations and stabilize housing affordability for residents. Eligible Projects (80%) - The remaining \$409,292,840 is projected to support capital improvements as described in the project listing.

ENACTED PURSUANT TO THE MUNICIPAL TAX RELIEF ACT, TITLE 5, CHAPTER 41 OF THE CODE OF LAWS OF SOUTH CAROLINA, 1976, AS AMENDED, PROVIDING FOR THE IMPOSITION OF A ONE PERCENT SALES AND USE TAX TO PROVIDE PROPERTY TAX RELIEF TO OWNER-OCCUPIED HOMES AND TO FINANCE CERTAIN PROJECTS UPON REFERENDUM APPROVAL; THE FORM OF THE BALLOT TO BE USED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA, AS FOLLOWS:

**ARTICLE I
FINDINGS**

Section 1.01 Findings

In connection with the enactment of this ordinance (the “**Ordinance**”), the City Council of the City of Greenville (the “**City Council**”), the governing body of the City of Greenville, South Carolina (the “**City**”), hereby finds and determines as follows:

(a) Pursuant to the Municipal Tax Relief Act, codified at Title 5, Chapter 41 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended (the “**Tax Relief Act**”), the City Council is authorized to impose an up to one percent sales and use tax (the “**Sales and Use Tax**”), subject to the approval of a referendum to be held in the City. The proceeds of the Sales and Use Tax must be applied for the purposes identified by the City pursuant to Section 5-41-120 of the Tax Relief Act, including utilizing at least 20% of the tax proceeds to provide a credit against a taxpayer’s municipal ad valorem tax liability for owner-occupied homes.

(b) The City Council has considered the funding of capital projects within the City with an estimated total cost of approximately \$410.8 million, has evaluated and determined which capital projects to be funded from the Sales and Use Tax, and has determined the form of the ballot question (the “**Ballot Question**”), pursuant to Section 5-41-120(E) of the Tax Relief Act.

(c) The City has estimated that a one percent sales and use tax within the City would generate an average of approximately \$64.0 million annually or over \$511.6 million during the 8-year period from May 1, 2027, to April 30, 2035.

(d) Pursuant to Section 5-41-120(I) of the Tax Relief Act, the Sales and Use Tax proceeds will be spent on the basis of a priority ranking assigned to the capital projects as established in **Exhibit A** attached hereto (the “**Capital Projects**”), subject to certain conditions and adjustments.

(e) Pursuant to Section 5-41-120(A)(2), since Greenville County has never imposed any tax pursuant to Chapter 10 or Chapter 37, Title 4 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, or pursuant to any local law enacted by the South Carolina General Assembly, the City may impose the Sales and Use Tax at any qualifying general election, subject to a successful referendum, the first opportunity being November 3, 2026.

(f) The City Council finds that the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City shall be benefited from the imposition of the Sales and Use Tax (i) to fund the Capital Projects and (ii) to utilize no less than twenty percent (20%) of the Sales and Use Tax proceeds to provide a credit against taxpayer’s municipal ad valorem tax liability for owner-occupied homes and is now minded to enact this Ordinance

imposing the Sales and Use Tax subject to a favorable referendum, to be held at the next qualifying general election, as defined in the Tax Relief Act, on November 3, 2026 (the “**Referendum**”).

(g) In accordance with Section 5-41-120 of the Tax Relief Act, this Ordinance (i) imposes the Sales and Use Tax subject to Referendum approval; (ii) contains the Ballot Question; (iii) specifies the purposes for which the Sales and Use Tax proceeds will be used as set forth on the Ballot Question attached hereto as **Exhibit B**; (iv) states the maximum time for which the Sales and Use Tax may be imposed; (v) states that no less than twenty percent (20%) of the Sales and Use Tax proceeds collected will be used to provide a nonrefundable credit against existing municipal ad valorem tax liability on property assessed pursuant to Section 12-43-220I of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended; (vi) states the maximum cost of the Capital Projects; and (vii) states the maximum amount of net Sales and Use Tax proceeds to be used to fund the Capital Projects.

ARTICLE II SALES AND USE TAX IMPOSITION, PURPOSES, TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Section 2.01 Imposition, Term

Subject to Referendum approval, City Council hereby imposes the Sales and Use Tax in the City for the 8-year period May 1, 2027, through April 30, 2035.

Section 2.02 Purposes

The Sales and Use Tax proceeds shall be applied for the purposes set forth on the Ballot Question (i) to defray the costs of Capital Projects and (ii) no less than twenty percent (20%) of the Sales and Use Tax proceeds will be used to provide a nonrefundable credit against existing municipal ad valorem tax liability in accordance with Section 5-41-170 of the Tax Relief Act on property assessed pursuant to Section 12-43-220I of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended.

Section 2.03 Terms and Conditions

The City Council has determined to require Sales and Use Tax proceeds to be spent on the basis of a priority ranking system, subject to the conditions set forth below:

- (a) The projects to be funded from the Sales and Use Tax proceeds, and each project's designated tier of funding priority, are listed on **Exhibit A** attached hereto. Except as otherwise permitted by subsections (b) and (c) below, the City Council has determined that those projects with a higher priority tier ranking will be funded before projects with a lower priority tier ranking (with Tier 1 being the highest priority ranking) as and to the extent that Sales and Use Tax proceeds become available. Nothing herein shall prevent the simultaneous funding of multiple projects within the same funding tier.
- (b) Once the construction contracts for 70% of all projects in a given funding tier have been let, the City can begin spending Sales and Use Tax proceeds on projects in the next funding tier. In addition to property acquisition and construction costs, Sales and Use Tax proceeds may be spent on procurement, project management, right-of-way acquisition and work, preconstruction work, such as design, engineering, and related planning, for projects in the next funding tier.
- (c) Notwithstanding the above, upon the written request of the City Manager, the City Council, by ordinance, may determine to fund projects in the next lower priority funding tier before projects of a higher priority funding tier (e.g., funding a Tier 2 project before funding a Tier 1 project). Such ordinance must contain findings that either (i) the higher priority project is delayed or impractical because of construction schedules or other events that may affect the schedule or scope for such project or (ii) the lower priority project has received partial funding from grants or other sources allowing such lower priority project to be

undertaken ahead of schedule. The written request and ordinance required by this subsection will specify either (i) the basis of the delay or scope adjustment, which may include issues concerning acquisition of title and rights-of-way, design and engineering considerations, environmental issues, the receipt of all necessary permits and regulatory approvals, bids in excess of project estimates and cost overruns and related scope reduction or value engineering, qualification of bidders, the availability of Sales and Use Tax proceeds or other funding sources, project impossibility, and force majeure or other unforeseen circumstances or (ii) the alternative source or sources of funding of the lower priority project.

- (d) The expenditures of Sales and Use Tax proceeds, if approved, will be subject to acquisition of property, rights-of-way, design and engineering considerations, the receipt of all necessary permits and regulatory approvals, funding of projects from other sources (including unanticipated grants that fund a project), bids in excess of project estimates, qualifications of bidders, cost overruns, exhaustion or insufficiency of net Sales and Use Tax proceeds to complete the projects in the order and priority stated above, and other unforeseen circumstances and conditions.
- (e) All Sales and Use Tax proceeds must be deposited into a separate fund of the City and not comingled with any other funds.

Section 2.04 Capital Projects Estimates and Sales and Use Tax Proceeds Estimates

(a) The total cost of the Capital Projects as described herein is expected to be approximately \$410.8 million and the net proceeds of the Sales and Use Tax to be used in such regard is expected to be approximately \$409.3 million.

ARTICLE III REFERENDUM

Section 3.01 Ballot Question

The Ballot Question as formulated by the City is included as ***Exhibit B*** attached hereto.

Section 3.02 Certification of Referendum

The appropriate election commission (the “***Election Commission***”) shall conduct the Referendum under the election laws of this State, *mutatis mutandis*, and shall certify the result to the City Council and to the South Carolina Department of Revenue no later than thirty days after the Referendum. The City Council shall thereafter declare the result of the Referendum by resolution.

Section 3.03 Notice of Referendum

To assist the Election Commission in complying with the Tax Relief Act, the contents of the notice of the Referendum required by the Tax Relief Act are described in ***Exhibit C*** hereto.

**ARTICLE IV
MISCELLANEOUS**

Section 4.01 Transmittal to Election Commission

Upon enactment of this Ordinance, the City Clerk is directed to provide the same to the Election Commission with direction to provide for the submission of the Ballot Question to the electors of the City at the Referendum.

Section 4.02 Authorization for Further Action

The City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager to take all actions necessary and convenient in connection with implementing this Ordinance.

Section 4.03 Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect upon second and final reading thereof.

Any such registered elector who has moved his or her place of residence within the City after the date on which said books of registration are closed for the Referendum, but before the date of the Referendum, shall be entitled to vote in his or her previous precinct of residence in the Referendum; provided, however, in case any registered elector shall have moved from one precinct in the City to another precinct in the City within thirty days prior to November 3, 2026, and shall have surrendered his or her registration certificate and has received a new certificate, such elector may vote in the precinct provided for by such new certificate. Persons who become of age during the 30-day period preceding the Referendum shall be entitled to register before the closing of the books if otherwise qualified.

Any person eligible to register to vote in the Referendum who has been discharged or separated from his or her service in the Armed Forces of the United States prior to November 3, 2026, and has returned home too late to register at the time when registration is required, is entitled to register for the purpose of voting in the Referendum after the discharge or separation from service, up to 5:00 p.m. on the day of the Referendum. This application for registration must be made at the office of the Greenville County Voter Registration and Elections Commission, and if qualified, the person must be issued a registration notification stating the precinct in which he or she is entitled to vote and a certification to the managers of the precinct that he or she is entitled to vote and should be placed on the registration rolls of the precinct.

The polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the polling places designated below and shall be open during these hours without intermission or adjournment. Appropriate vote recorders will be provided at the polling places for the casting of ballots on the aforesaid question. Managers of Election will be appointed by the Greenville County Voter Registration and Elections Commission. 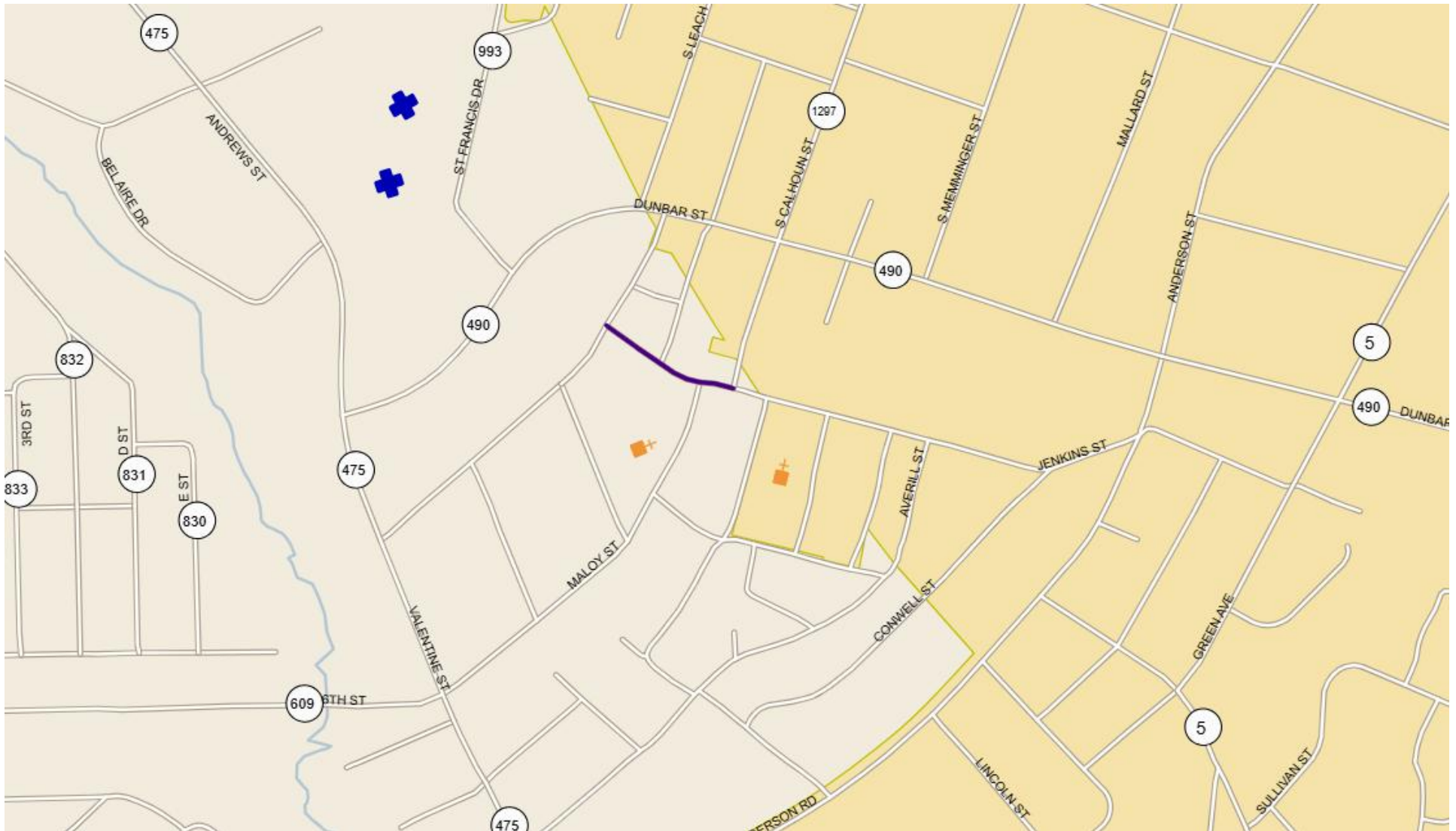

Document Summary:

The South Carolina Department of Transportation owns two blocks of Jenkins Street, measuring approximately 415 linear feet, from Minus Street to Calhoun Street. The remainder of Jenkins Street is owned by the City. The Greenville Housing Fund is developing the Huddle at Sterling multi-family affordable housing development and has requested the city of Greenville take ownership of SCDOT's portion of the Jenkins Street to help navigate permitting requirements and streamline the site permitting process. The City has performed a preliminary review of the development and is supportive of assuming full ownership on Jenkins Street which will facilitate more efficient regulatory control and implementation of the City's complete streets and urban design standards.

Impact if Denied:

The City will not control the two blocks of Jenkins Street currently owned by SCDOT and Greenville Housing Fund's street improvements will have to be modified to meet SCDOT's permitting requirements.

Financial Impact:

Long term ownership and maintenance of an additional 415 linear feet of roadway.

TO REQUEST REMOVAL OF SECTIONS OF JENKINS STREET (S-1293) FROM

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) owns and maintains as part of the State Highway System a certain section of public road located in the city of Greenville ("City") known as Jenkins Street (S-1293) from Minus Street (S-1294) to Calhoun Street (S-80) ("Jenkins Street"); and

WHEREAS, the City desires to accept ownership of Jenkins Street to facilitate more efficient regulatory control and implementation of the City's complete streets and urban design standards;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA, the City Manager is authorized to execute the Request For Transfer Of Road From State Secondary System To Another Governmental Agency, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A with respect to an approximate 0.09 mile section of Jenkins Street (S-1293). The City Manager is herewith authorized to carry out any action and/or to execute such documents as is necessary or reasonable in relation to the transfer and acceptance of the specified road sections into the City street system. Upon removal from the State Highway System, the specified road sections shall be accepted into and become a part of the City's street system subject to the absolute control of the City in the same manner and under the same terms as applicable to other streets in the City system.
